How to tell a good secret from a bad secret.



Never keep a secret that makes you feel worried or scared.

Always tell someone you trust.

There are good secrets and bad secrets.



Keeping a secret about a surprise birthday party is good fun.

Everyone finds out the secret in the end.



Keeping a secret about a crime or abuse is bad.

The person wants things to stay secret.

If someone abuses you don't keep it a secret.

Tell someone you trust.

You will not get into trouble.



Here are some examples of abuse:



Taking your money or your things.

Stealing is a crime.



Being nasty or hurting you.

People should not abuse you.



Sexually abusing you.

People should treat you with respect.



Not caring for you properly.

You have the right to good care.

What to do if someone is abusing you.



Tell someone you trust. Tell lots of people.

Report it to your local Public Protection Investigation Unit'

Keeping bad secrets will make you feel stressed and unhappy.
